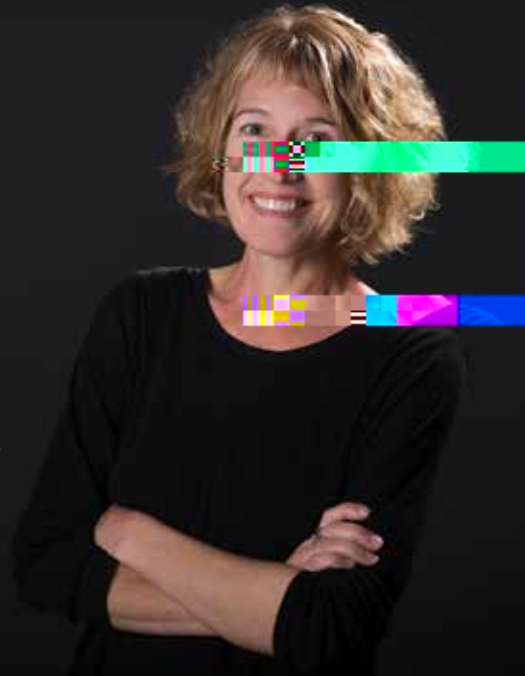

Laura Wright is Professor of English at Western Carolina University, where she specializes in postcolonial literatures and theory, ecocriticism, and animal studies. Coetzee's Narratives of Displacement* (Routledge, 2006 and 2009) and *Wilderness into Civilized Shapes: Reading the Postcolonial Environment* (U of Georgia P, 2010). She is lead editor (with Jane Poyner and Elleke Boehmer) of *Approaches to Teaching Coetzee's Disgrace*

and *Other Works* (MLA, 2014). Her most recent monograph, *The Vegan Studies Project: Food, Animals, and Gender in the Age of Terror*, was published by the U of Georgia P in 2015. 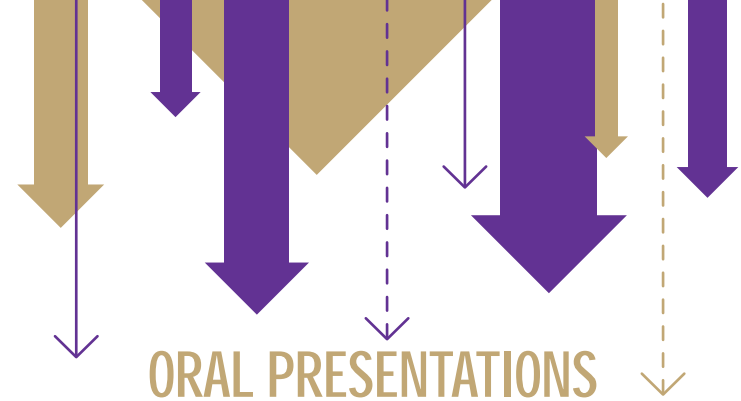
